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### United Nations: sport and human rights

➢In 2001 Kofi Annan - appointed the first Special Advisor on Sport for Development and Peace, Adolf Ogi;

➢ In 2002 an Inter-Agency Task Force on Sport for Development and Peace was formed, which published a report on the role of sport towards the attainment of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs);

"[...] recognising the important role of sport in the implementation of the internationally agreed development goals, including those contained in the Millennium Declaration" (UNGA, 2003).



The MDGs (UNDP, 2000). The UN turned also towards the world of sport to achieve the following objectives:

- 1. eradicate extreme poverty and hunger;
- 2. achieve universal primary education;
- 3. promote gender equality and empower women;
- 4. reduce child mortality;
- 5. improve maternal health;
- 6. combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases;
- 7. ensure environmental sustainability;
- 8. develop a global partnership for development.



First International Conference on Sport for Development (SfD) was held in Magglingen, Switzerland and governments, the UN and NGOs representatives pledged to work towards "*creating a better world through sport*"



Sport as a means to promote **education**, **health**, **development and peace** (UNGA, 2003 onwards);

Proclaimed 2005 as the International Year of Sport and Physical Education (UNGA, 2003);

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April, 6<sup>th</sup> was declared as the International Day of Sport for Development and Peace (UNGA Res. 19/08/2013), with the support of the IOC. As a result, it has been celebrated every year since 2014

### The #whitecard stencil + the white field

The high schools involved can tag the #WhiteCard logo (stencil) on various sports fields. By affixing the White Card label to any kind of playing field (for eg. football pitch, tennis court, basketball court, etc.) players agree to play according to the rules expressed by the #WhiteCard: equality, peace, inclusion.

By playing on a «White Field», athletes know that they are playing in a neutral, safe, respectful and caring place.


